

RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

GLASS: Clear and colored glass jars and bottles used to package most food, beverages and household items (rinsed, lids removed and debris-free).



PAPER: Newspapers (including glossy inserts), paper bags, mail, junk mail, envelopes, magazines, telephone books, mixed paper, white paper, and shredded office paper.



CANS: Aluminum, tin, and steel including beverage, food, and empty aerosol cans.



PLASTIC: Items with the numbers 1 or 2 located on the bottom surrounded by three arrows or marked PET, PETE, or HDPE (rinsed and debris-free). Typically includes clear plastic soda bottles, milk and water jugs, and others containing household foods and supplies.

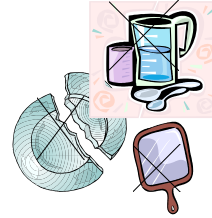


CARDBOARD: Plain corrugated cardboard (flattened and bundled). Also chipboard packaging including nonperishable food boxes, beer and soda cartons, cracker, cake, and cereal boxes without plastic pouches or inserts.



NON-RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

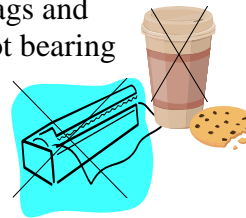
GLASS: Broken glass, light bulbs, ceramic dishes, Pyrex, china, mirrors, windows, cookware, and drinking glasses, and flower pots.



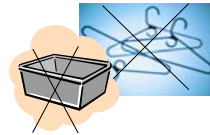
PAPER: Waxed milk/juice cartons, facial tissue, napkins, paper plates and cups, heat resistant ovenware, and styrofoam



PLASTIC: Lids, plastic bags and wrap, and all other items not bearing numbers 1 or 2 or marked PET, PETE, or HDPE. Examples include coffee cups, meat trays, lids or caps, and egg cartons.



METAL: Aluminum foil, pie plates, coat hangers, cookware/bakeware, drinkmix containers, pipes, and wire.



CARDBOARD: Any cardboard CONTAMINATED BY FOOD.



RECYCLING GUIDELINES



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GLASS (CLEAR, GREEN, BROWN)

Glass, food and beverage containers can easily be recycled by removing caps and lids. Please rinse out containers. Labels can remain.



ALUMINUM AND BIMETAL CANS

All food and beverage cans are recyclable. Rinse out cans before placing them in your recycling container. Labels can remain.



PLASTICS

Plastic soda bottles, milk jugs, water jugs and laundry products labeled #1 or #2 are acceptable. Other plastic containers such as bowls and plates are not acceptable. Please remove lids and rinse out containers. Labels can



PAPER PRODUCTS

Newspaper, mixed paper, white paper, junk mail (remove or block out your address), cereal boxes, envelopes, cardboard boxes (broken down and flat), magazines and telephone books.



LATEX PAINT

DISPOSAL

Latex based paint is not considered household hazardous waste, so it can be disposed of quite easily.

- ⇒ Remove and **discard** the paint can lid.
- ⇒ Make sure the paint can is $\frac{1}{2}$ full or less. (If the can is more than $\frac{1}{2}$ full, pour excess into another container, such as a milk jug or coffee can.)
- ⇒ Add clay-based kitty litter or absorbent material so that the can is about $\frac{3}{4}$ full.
- ⇒ Stir paint / kitty litter mixture.
- ⇒ If liquid paint remains, add more kitty litter.
- ⇒ Allow paint / kitty litter mixture to air dry until hard.
(will take approximately 1-2 days)
- ⇒ Dispose of can in the garbage without the lid.

Please note: DO NOT put the lid back on the paint can!! Cans will not be picked up by your trash hauler if they can't see the paint is dry.
