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From the Desk of Public Works Director

The Township Public Works Department has had a very busy and productive summer. As Public Works Director, I would like to thank our residents for their cooperation during our projects on campus and on the roadways. Your Township staff, department heads, team leaders and team members are also deserving of a pat on the back after this challenging season.

Space does not permit detailed explanation of all the projects underway, so here's a recap.

- ⇒ **Kolapechka Park** - Located at Coffeetown and Sand Spring Roads, the facilities at this park are almost complete. The athletic fields still need some time to grow in, but Bob Grim of Grim's Landscaping is managing the turf development as a donation to the Township. Many children are using the 2-5 and 5-12 year old playgrounds while the adults are enjoying the fitness path. This park has been connected to the adjacent Levans Recreational Park providing over .85 mile of safe walking area.
- ⇒ **Laurys Station Fire House Park** - This new park project is located on Egypt Road adjacent to the Laurys Station Fire Company and is going great guns! Land contouring, seeding and some drainage work have been completed.
- ⇒ **Park Valley Road Bridge Project** - We are awaiting permits from DEP in order to replace the bridge over the Coplay Creek on Park Valley Road.
- ⇒ Numerous drainage improvement projects and road crossings have been completed.
- ⇒ Paving and road maintenance projects were completed in mid-September.
- ⇒ After receiving many comments about drivers ignoring stop signs and speeding, especially in residential neighborhoods, the Township also studied the sight distance at all intersections to be certain they met established criteria.


TIP Projects - The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is the locally endorsed list of projects proposed for implementation with Federal assistance. North Whitehall is pleased to have four projects on the list, more than any other township in Lehigh County.

1. The Route 309 corridor improvement project continues to move forward. Right-of-way acquisition continues in earnest and final details are being ironed out. Funding is in place and construction is now anticipated in 2006.

2. The signalization improvements proposed for Route 309 at Sand Spring Road and Education Park Drive should occur in 2007.

3. Realignment and signalization on Route 873 at the Neffs Church are in the design phase with construction scheduled in 2008-2009.

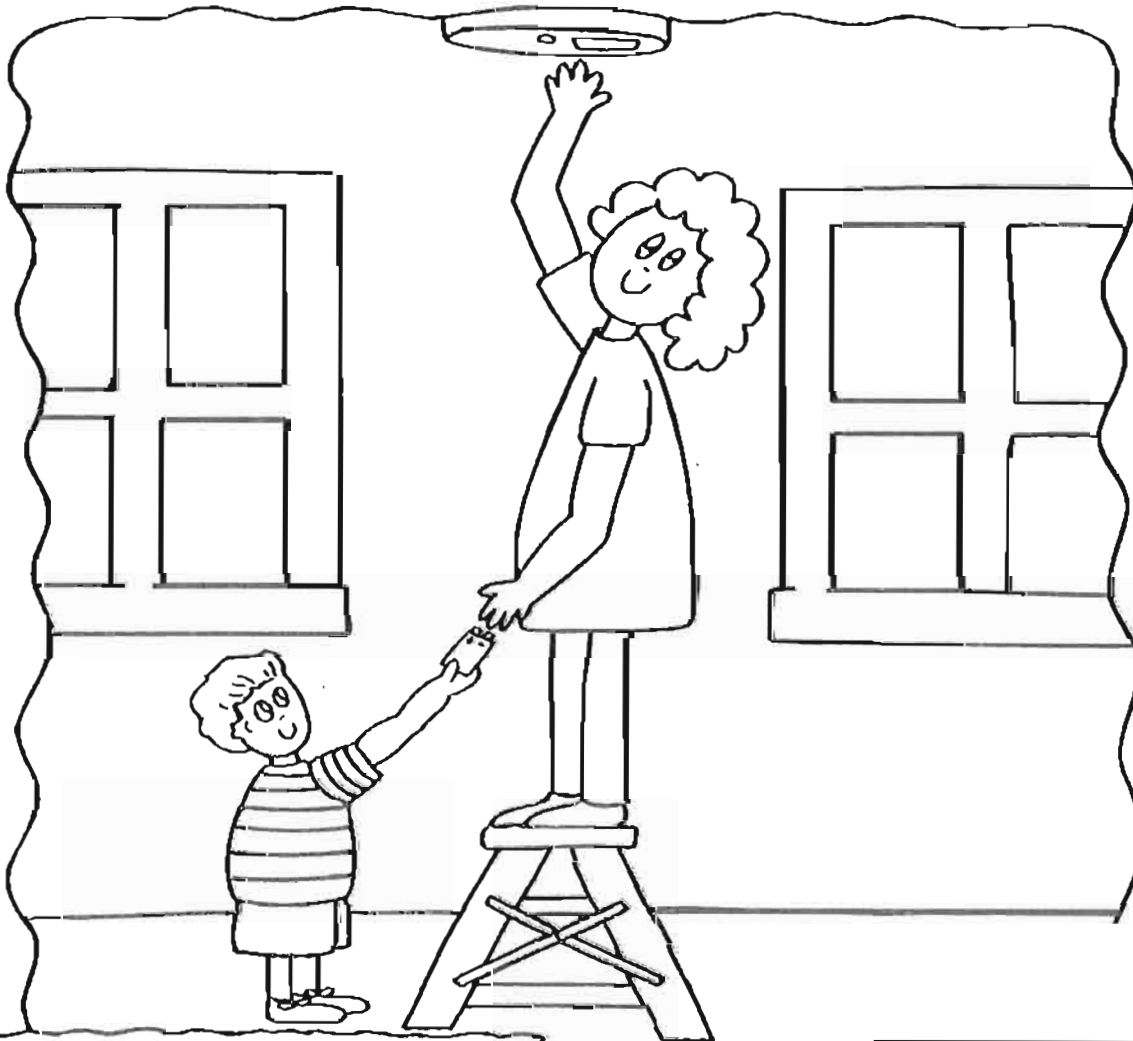

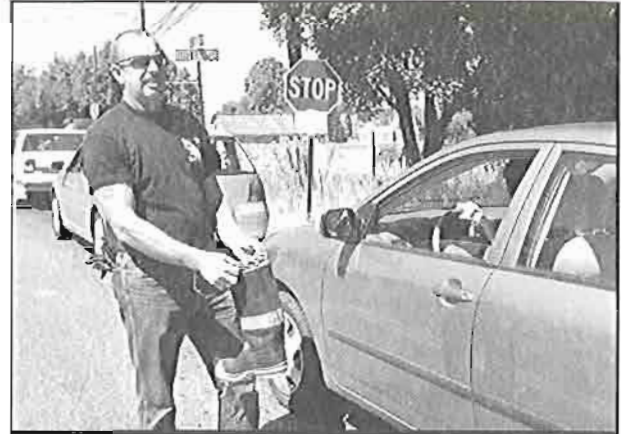
VFW Post 8344 News

From the Tax Office. . . For the last quarter of 2005, regular tax office hours remain the same at: Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays 10 AM to 5:30 PM and the 2nd and 3rd Saturdays of the month 9 AM to 12 Noon.

The following changes should be noted:

October: Closed Thursday, October 20th through Saturday, October 22nd.

November: Closed Thursday, November 24th and Friday, November 25th.

December: Open Saturday, December 31st, 9 AM to noon.

Payment of tax bills issued in 2005 must be in the office by December 31st, 2005. Taxes unpaid as of January 1st, 2006 will be turned over to the designated collector of delinquent taxes. Payments received between December 15th and December 31st, 2005 must be in cash, cashiers' checks or money orders (Discover Card also accepted for school tax payments only - a charge is applicable to this transaction, based on total of taxes). **Personal checks are not accepted during this period.**

Reminder...moving permits are required to move into, out of or within the Township and are available at the Tax Office. Please call 610-799-2032 for updates on special hours and closings.

Prescription Discount Card Program

The County of Lehigh has contracted with Comprehensive Health Care Solutions to bring Lehigh County residents a Prescription Discount Card program that allows cardholders access to a savings of 10% to 50% on most prescription drugs. *This is NOT insurance.

Who is Eligible?

All Lehigh County residents! There are **NO** application forms to complete, **NO** age restrictions, **NO** deductibles, **NO** membership fees, and **NO** health requirements. Just pick up a card and use it to receive discounts at over 53,000 participating pharmacies nationwide. One card is all you need for your entire family.

Where do I get my Prescription Discount Card?

Lehigh County residents may pick up their **FREE** prescription discount card at Township Municipal Building or at the Tax Collector's Office.

How do I use my Prescription Discount Card?

Once you have your card, you may use it to receive discounts at one of the 53,000 participating pharmacies. You may use the card as often as you wish on any generic, brand name, or 90-day supply mail order drugs **NOT** covered by insurance or another prescription discount plan. If you have exceeded the maximum amount allowed by your plan or if a prescribed medication is not included in your current plans formulary, you may use this prescription discount card to receive a discount.

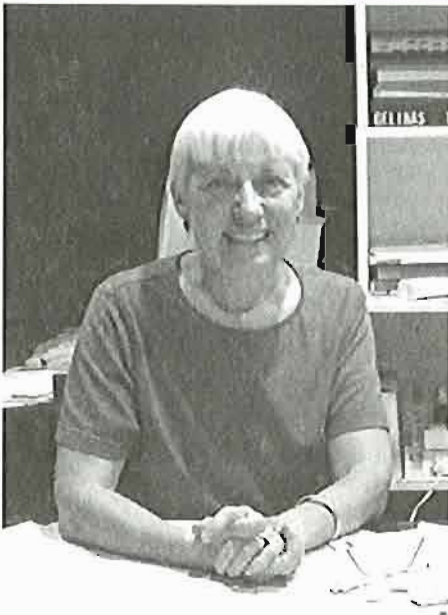

audits are performed on her accounts and she is proud of the fact that she has had clean audits for all her years as tax collector.

While the tax collector does not make policy decisions, Susan is frequently the first local official to be contacted when residents have questions, tax-related or otherwise. She often helps senior citizens complete tax/rent rebate forms and says it is very satisfying to be able to direct people to the information they are looking for.

Christmas Tree Recycling

Township residents will be able to drop trees off at the designated recycling bay located to the rear of the Municipal Building starting December 26, 2005 until January 31, 2006. Please remove all tinsel and garland before disposing of your tree. No plastic tree bags are allowed. All metal frames must be removed from holiday wreaths. Christmas trees will be recycled into mulch, as part of our organic recycling program.

Fall Leaves

The Township encourages residents to bring their leaves to the Municipal Building for recycling. Leaves may be deposited in the designated leaf bin behind the building. These leaves will be recycled into compost.

Burning of leaves is permitted in the Township (we prefer that you recycle them), however the following restrictions apply: (1) Fires shall not be set, maintained or allowed to burn before sunrise or after sundown. (2) Fires must be confined in closed container made of brick, stone or metal with a mesh cover with openings of not more than one square inch, and such containers should be kept a distance of 10 feet from dwellings, property lines and any other structures, wooden fences or piled combustible materials. (3) The use of containers which are in disrepair is prohibited. (4) Fires shall be set and maintained in areas free of weeds and shall be attended by an adult at all times. (5) **Residents are requested to be considerate of their neighbors when burning with regard to excess smoke and stench.** (6) Fires are prohibited on streets, alleys, public grounds or rights-of-way. (7) Burning of construction waste and household garbage is prohibited.



Is Your Water Sneaking Out of the House?

Plumbing leaks inside your home are sometimes easy to catch - you see water dripping from the faucet, hear water running at night, or see a puddle forming under a sink. But sometimes a leak can be very difficult to detect.

One of the biggest culprits for "sneaky leaks" is the toilet. Worn out parts in your toilet can cause silent leaks - undetectable to the eye and ear. But these leaks are detectable on your water bill as thousands of gallons can be lost over time, raising your water bill each time.

An easy way to test your toilet for a "sneaky leak" is to take the lid off the back of the tank and drop in a few drops of food coloring. Wait a few minutes without flushing and then look into the toilet bowl. If you see any of the colored water in the bowl, then you know you have a leak! Of course this test won't work with those blue toilet bowl cleaning tabs, so wait until the blue solution runs out to conduct this test.

Sneaky toilet leaks can waste large volumes of water over time, but they are usually simple and inexpensive to fix with some updated parts and an enterprising spirit. - *Information courtesy of Lehigh County Authority*

Tire recycling suspended

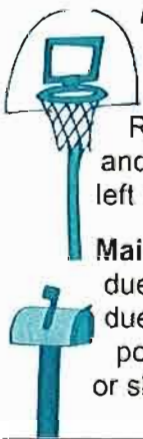
Tire recycling is suspended from December 1 until April 1. The Township will be accepting tires starting April 1, 2006.

4. The resurfacing of the Ironton Rail Trail should occur shortly after the completion of the Ormrod Wastewater Extension Project in early 2006.

Public Sewer Update - A bid award, in the amount of \$1,820,063.00, was recently given to the Joao & Bradley Construction Company to begin Phase One of a sanitary sewer system extension to the village of Ormrod. Construction should begin this fall. At this time the only municipal sewerage exists in the Timberidge subdivision. The new line will serve 150 equivalent dwelling units (EDUs).

The Township worked closely with several agencies to move this project along. Lehigh County's Office of Community Development has assisted greatly in finding and obtaining grants in order to keep the cost per property as low as possible. This office will also assist individual residents in obtaining grants or low interest loans for their lateral and tap-in costs.

The Township is also participating in a regional well-water quality study, conducted by Lehigh County Authority, that encompasses most of western Lehigh County. The study will sample wells in the western part of the Township in order to determine the presence of any contaminants



It's not too early to be thinking about winter - Remove Obstacles From Rights-of-Way.

Residents are reminded to remove obstacles from roads and cul-de-sacs prior to winter weather setting in. These items can include portable basketball hoops, garbage cans, parked vehicles, RVs, boats, trailers etc. The obstacles make it difficult for snowplow operators to navigate the roads and turn around in cul-de-sacs. The Township will not be responsible for damage to any item left in the street right-of-way.

Mailboxes. The Township office receives calls concerning damage to mailboxes, fences and shrubs due to plowing. This is generally caused by the snow wash coming off the plow. Damages can vary due to the type and amount of snow and the condition and construction of the mailbox and post or fencing materials. The Township will not be responsible for repairs to mailboxes, fences or shrubs placed within the legally defined right-of-way of its' roads.

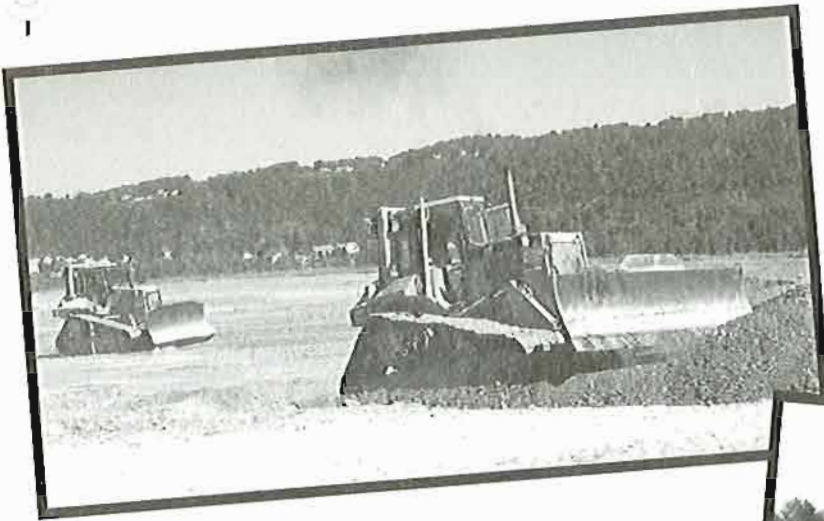

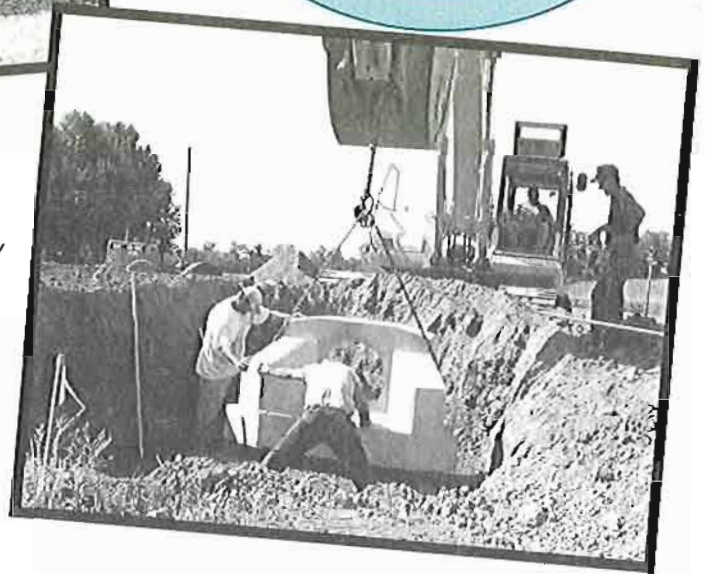

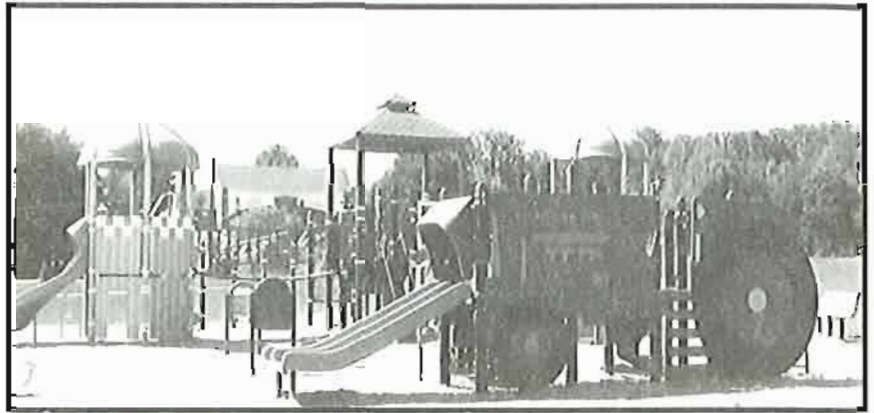
