

Board of Supervisors Adopts 2005 Budget by Brenda Norder, Treasurer **Township Real Estate Taxes Remain the Same**

The 2005 budget for the Township was approved by the Board of Supervisors in December. Once again, residents will not see an increase in the 3/4 mill real estate tax. The tax rate has not changed since 1997.

For example, the owners of a home assessed at \$100,000.00 will pay only \$75.00 in Township real estate taxes.

The primary revenue source is from taxes (Real Estate Taxes, Earned Income Tax and Real Estate Transfer Tax), the remainder is derived primarily from licenses and permits, charges for services, investments, intergovernmental revenues and grants.

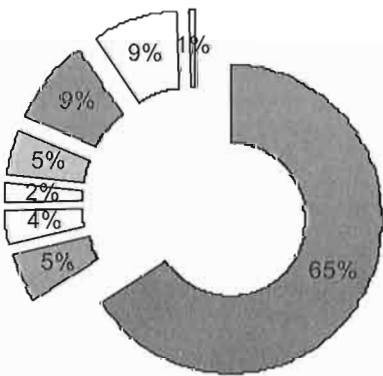
On the expenditure side, highway expenses account for about 27% of all expenditures. General

government, public safety, insurance, benefits, recreation, health/welfare, debt service and sanitation account for the balance of the expenses.

Due to a projected increase in PPL costs and in order to maintain a balanced Street Light Fund, the Street Light Tax will be raised from .30/ft. to .33/ft for developed areas.

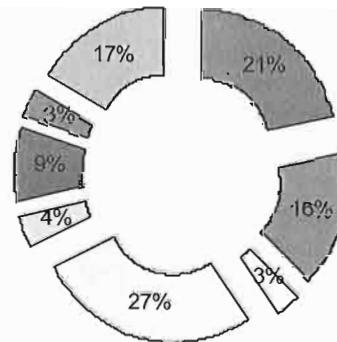
The total amount budgeted in all funds for 2005 is \$12,713,416.00.

The year 2004 in review by Brenda Norder

The following achievements were accomplished during 2004:

- A new 20,000 sq. ft. public works garage was constructed.
- A new 3,200 sq. ft. equipment shed was constructed.
- The municipal building received a facelift in the form of new windows, doors and facade.
- Major storm water management improvement projects were

completed on Ancinetta Drive and Rockdale Road.

- 3.21 miles of roadway were paved using one of several processes.
- 18.8 miles of road received maintenance surface treatments.
- Approximately 343,000 lineal ft. of line striping was performed.
- Replacement of the Copeechan Road Bridge was completed.
- 7 new ordinances were adopted; 2004-1 - created an Inter-govern-

mental Agreement with Lehigh County with regards to the Ormrod Sewer Project.

2004-2 - adopted the Uniform Construction Codes.

2004-3 - authorized joining the PA Municipal Health Insurance Co-op.

2004-4 - revised the SALDO submission requirements.

2004-5 - regulates parking of vehicles on roadways during snowfalls and prohibits shoveling of snow on streets.

Year in review continued



- Winter Reminders -

*** Remove basketball stands from rights-of-way.**

Residents who own portable basketball hoops are being reminded that you must remove them from the roads and cul-de-sacs before winter weather arrives. The portable hoops make it difficult for snow plow operators to navigate the roads and turn around in the cul-de-sacs. In addition to basketball hoops, other items that should not be left on the street right-of-way during the winter include: garbage cans, parked vehicles, RVs, boats, trailers etc. The Township will not be responsible for any damages to such items if home owners fail to remove them from the Township street right-of-way during snow removal activities.

With regards to parked vehicles, pursuant to Township Ordinance 2004-5, any Public Works employee, Township Zoning Officer or Township Supervisor is authorized to remove any parked/abandoned vehicle parked on a Township road after the start of a snowfall.

*** Mailboxes.** The Township office receives calls concerning damage to mailboxes, fences and shrubs due to plowing. This is generally caused by the snow wash coming off the plow. Pursuant to Township Ordinance 2004-6, The Township will not be responsible for repairs to mailboxes, fences or shrubs placed within the legally defined right-of-way of its' roads.

*** State Roads.** The following roads in the Township are owned and maintained by the state. PennDOT is responsible for the snow plowing on these roadways: Levans Rd., Mauch Chunk Rd., Willow St., Park Ave., Old Post Rd., Sand Spring Rd., Kernsville Rd., Neffs Laurys Rd., Scheidys Rd., Orefield Rd., Rt. 329, Rt. 309, Rt. 145, Rt. 873, Cedar Crest Blvd., Game Preserve Rd., Shankweiler Rd. (east of Rt. 309), Paradise Rd. (from Neffs Laurys to Rising Sun Rds.), Rising Sun Rd. (from Old Post to Paradise Rds.), and Coffeetown Rd (Levans to Orefield Rds.). PennDOT can be contacted at 610-798-4280.

2004-6 - establishes the liability for mailboxes, posts, vegetation and turf placed in right-of-way.

2004-7 - provided for a continued franchise with a cable company.

- Our popular summer sports camps have grown from 7 to 12, with over 400 youths participating in the 2004 camp season.
- Additions to our vehicle inventory included: '04 Toro turf mower, an asphalt reclaimer/hot box, a 2002 Dodge Intrepid administrative car and an '05 International Tanker (Laurys Station Fire Company).
- 2 new employees joined our ranks: Darlene Uherick, Administrative Clerk and Sarah Heckman, part-time custodian.
- Township employees attended 15 training/educational seminars throughout the year.
- At our 2 cleanups we processed 762 vehicles, eliminated 103.7 tons of rubbish and 90 appliances with Freon were discarded safely.
- A total of nine subdivisions and three land developments added ninety parcels to the tax duplicate.
- The Zoning Office issued 223 building permits, 23 electrical permits, 8 plumbing permits, 71 driveway permits, 118 zoning permits and 2 sign permits.
- One fire hydrant was added.

From the Desk of the Public Works Director *By Ron Stahley*

The Public Works crew is busily moving into their new home. The 20,000 sq. ft. steel and masonry structure was added alongside the original Township building this past fall. The new garage, along with a 3,200 sq. ft. shed built earlier in 2004, will enable the Township's road and park maintenance equipment to be stored in one place. Previously some equipment had to be stored off site in private, rented structures and retrieved as needed.

The facility features areas for safer welding and vehicle repair. Vehicle lifts will enhance the safety in maintenance functions. Sensors for hazardous fumes automatically turn on exhaust and fresh air fans and a fire alarm system automatically notifies the appropriate contacts of trouble. The existing garage will be vacated and the expansion of cramped administrative offices and record storage space, into this space, is the next step in the improvements.

Façade and canopy improvements protect visitors approaching the administrative offices and provide dramatic aesthetic impact. In the near future landscaping and site improvements will further add to the building's character and appeal. Parking on site has also been increased. Built for maximum useful life, the facility will serve our citizens and be a source of community pride for decades to come.

The certificates were issued in recognition of the extraordinary efforts put forth by all the responders during Hurricane Ivan and the emergencies related to the storm.

Local Fire Company Purchases New Pierce Tanker-Pumper

On September 14th, the Laurys Station Volunteer Fire Co. No. 1 of North Whitehall Township accepted delivery of a Pierce 3000 gallon Tanker-Pumper at the Pierce manufacturing facility in Appleton WI. The unit, constructed on a 2005 International 7600 chassis, features a 430 HP Caterpillar diesel engine, a 2000 gallon per minute Waterous pump, an Harrison 8 KW hydraulic generator, and driver's and passenger's side Zico lifts for the suction hose and 3500 gallon portable water tank.

Significant funding support for the purchase of this unit was received from the federal Department of Homeland Security Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program, North Whitehall Township's Long Term Emergency Services Grant Fund, and the Ernest Remaley Memorial Fund. In addition, funding for the purchase of additional items to

equip the vehicle was received from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Volunteer Fire Company Grant Program.

Winter Driving Safety Tips

Winter driving can place heavy demands on your car. Here are some suggestions to help you get through the winter months safely.

- Slow down...slow acceleration, slow breaking and slow turning.
- Winter slush and road dirt build up on headlights and can reduce brightness by 50%. Keep a rag in the car to clean the headlights when necessary.
- Keep a bag of kitty litter or sand in your trunk. If you get stuck in snow or ice, place the sand or kitty litter under whichever wheels provide the driving power in order to provide traction.
- Make sure your wiper blades are in good condition.
- Have a flashlight, flares, shovel and a heavy-duty ice scraper or deicing spray handy.
- Take the time to thoroughly clean the snow and ice off your car for the best visibility.
- Do not drive during a snow storm unless absolutely necessary. Staying home longer will not only increase your safety and comfort, but it allows the public works employees to more efficiently clear the roads for safer travel.
- When a storm is forecast, move your vehicle(s) to off-street parking. This allows for maximum efficiency in storm cleanup. If your vehicle is left on the street it will be towed away at your expense, pursuant to Township Ordinance 2004-5.

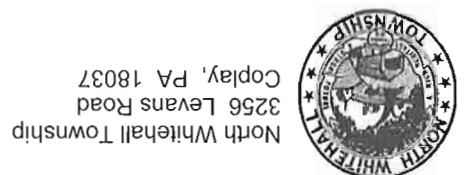
